General Meaning

dic·tion·ar·y

(dik'sha ner'e), n., pl. -aries
containing a selection of the words of a language, usually arranged alphabetically, giving information about their meanings, pronunciations, etymologies, inflected forms, etc., expressed in either the same or another language.
lexicon; glossary. **2** a book giving information on English dictionary: a dictionary of English; a Japanese-English dictionary. **2** a book giving information on particular subjects or on a particular class of words, names, or facts, usually arranged alphabetically.
graphical dictionary: a dictionary of mathematical symbols. **a** a list of codes, terms, keys, etc., and a list of words used by a computer program or system. **standard against which to check the spelling of words.** [1520-30; < ML *dictionarium* + *-ary*]
